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1	MS. NAGOURNEY: Good evening. I
2	declare this public hearing to be open. My name is
3	Jennifer Nagourney. I'm the Executive Director of
4	the Charter School Office for the Department of
5	Education, and I have been appointed by the
6	Secretary of Education to conduct this public
7	hearing.
8	Campus Community School has applied
9	for renewal of its charter. As required by law, the
10	matter was referred to the Charter School
11	Accountability Committee. The Committee has issued
12	its final report, which recommended renewal of the
13	charter without conditions.
14	This joint public hearing is being
15	held by the Department of Education and the State
16	Board of Education to assist in the decision of
17	whether the criteria set forth for renewal in the
18	Delaware Code has been satisfied. This hearing
19	provides the school an opportunity to receive public
20	comment.
21	I will now ask the others with me
22	today to introduce themselves.
23	MS. HICKEY: I'm Catherine Hickey.
24	I'm a Deputy Attorney General with the Delaware



1 Department of Justice, and I'm serving as the hearing officer's counsel this evening. 2 MS. JOHNSON: Donna Johnson, 3 4 Executive Director of the Delaware State Board of Education. 5 MS. BUNTING: Nina Lou Bunting, State 6 7 Board of Education. MS. NAGOURNEY: I would like the 8 record to reflect that the notice of the time, date, 9 and place of today's public hearing was published in 10 11 the News Journal and the Delaware State News. 12 In addition, notice was posted at the Charter School Accountability Committee's official 13 14 place of business, on the Department of Education's 15 official website, and on the State Public Meeting Calendar on the State's official website. 16 17 Further, the school was personally notified of the time, date, and place of today's 18 public hearing. 19 A court reporter is present so that a 20 21 record of this hearing can be made. It will be necessary for each speaker to clearly identify 22 23 himself or herself before beginning to speak so that 24 the court reporter will be able to note who you are.



The record of this hearing will be provided to the Secretary of Education and members of the State Board of Education, together with any written or electronic comments received at or before this public hearing. We will proceed in the following First, we will hear from any manner: representatives in the charter who wish to comment. Then we will take comments from anyone else who desires so speak. There were sign-ups in the back of the room, and I have a list here with three names on If there is anyone else who desires to comment, it. please raise your hand now and come forward. Okav. I would ask each speaker to limit their comments to three minutes. information that you cannot fit into your testimony, there will be opportunity to submit through the public comment process, and the record remains open through the end of this week. I intend to be as liberal as time and reason allow in accepting comments. However, I do reserve the right to limit comment if it's purely repetitive or cumulative. At this point we will

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1 accept comments from any representative of the 2 school. MS. CARONA: Hi. My name is Gina 3 4 Marie Carona, and I'm a parent as well as a substitute for Campus Community School. 5 started in the summertime just stopping in the 6 7 school and just helping out in the library. on to substitute, which kept me busy every day, 8 because I was getting called every day. 9 10 I just want to start by saying that I 11 have had my son in a variety of schools, where I 12 started him with a nursery school when he was little; went into a public school; and then, from 13 14 there, went to a private school and now a charter. 15 The happiest we have ever been for him has been with 16 the charter school. 17 The Campus Community Charter, it's been the best school that, not only because it's 18 private, but it's also related to the public school, 19 I guess you would say the way the public school does 20 21 things, they follow the same guidelines, but they have that private tutoring, which really helps with 22 23 academics.

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Academically, not only does Campus

Community School have the highest test scores in Delaware, but no matter where the kids are at in their level of learning, they leave them there. We have the time to get the extra help, to get the extra tutoring. They take them one on one when needed.

For example, with learning disabilities, I know my son has ADHD, and they brought him from not being able to focus to working with someone and being able to grow in his learning experience and just going from just being -- not being able to concentrate and focus to going to challenging, from needing extra help to striving for excellence.

It's just a huge difference that the charter school has made, whereas I have found that most public schools have been -- kids just slip through the cracks. I hear stories all the time that they are just not getting the one-on-one help they need. Even though the groups are large -- in charter schools some people say it's challenging because the groups are very large and there's 20-some kids. But they also have to learn how to -- how to get along in life, how to get along in a

social atmosphere, how to be able to work on a team when they get to a job one day.

And that's something that really set out to me, that they really work with these kids on learning social -- just how to be socially acceptable in the world, how to greet people, going into a bank, or even to the point, not just socially, but also with maybe balancing a checkbook or things like that, things that are really important in life, and not just, you know, not just you get through school.

As far as respect, I have never seen a more respectful school than Campus Community School. The kids, they don't use foul language, because we don't allow it. Our principal puts a stop to anything like that, that if that's going on, it gets addressed right away. And these kids just really, they know what they are — they know how to act. They know how to act with another person.

They know how to act with each other. They don't — All right. A lot of times kids will take their family life to school with them, and that's hard, because maybe they're having troubles at home.

Campus has a way — their teachers, their staff,

their principal has a way of just working with these kids and saying, "You know what? It's okay to have issues. We all do. But when you come here, we are going to help. We are going to work with you on that. We are not just going to toss you aside and say you are failing."

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They don't just fail them. They want to see them succeed, so they work with them on every step of the way. I have never seen anything like that, not in any school, private sector, not in public school. I just -- it's something that's not been seen ever in my lifetime, and I'm 41 years old.

The staff and the principal, Okay. they go above and beyond. As far as like if a child is disrupting a class, they will go the extra mile and say, "You know what? Send them down to Ms. Jones' office instead, " just because they can go there and get that one-on-one help that they need. Every teacher is involved in that. It doesn't matter what grade they teach. They all put their -they all put their efforts in to meet them where they are at. And it's just amazing to me the teamwork that's involved in that, whereas in another school you might just have this teacher teaches this

grade and only this grade. It's not like that.

It's just not like that there. It really is one big family, including the kids, the teachers, and the parents.

Now, the parents come in whenever necessary for meetings, and they all work together to make their child succeed.

Another thing I would just like to say is that a lot of people say charter schools can be challenging. Yes, they are gifted. They have to pass certain tests, you know, to do certain things and to get certain places academically. But I feel that it broadens their horizons, it opens their minds up. You don't want to keep them at that grade level. You want them to get to the next and the next.

So what I, you know, what I have to say is that it's okay to push them a little bit to make them realize that they can do more. The teachers, they know how to interact socially with these kids to get them to interact publicly. The teaching makes all the difference, independently and in a group. And in closing I just want to say that Campus Community Charter, in my opinion, is the best

1 school in all areas that I have ever seen. allow diversity from all backgrounds and cultures to 2 grow together. Thank you. 3 MS. NAGOURNEY: 4 Thank you. Do I have to speak into 5 MYA BOWERS: 6 this? I don't. Okav. So my name is Mya Renea Lagana Bowers, and I'm a student at Campus Community 7 School. 8 The one thing that I like the most 9 10 about Campus is that it's a learning environment 11 where you have the ability to use your knowledge 12 freely, but it's not just that you are just strictly doing work; you actually can have fun while you are 13 14 learning. 15 Also, I think CCS means to other like students at our school is that it's a sense of 16 17 It's a place of security and safety, and community. 18 it's where everyone can trust everybody. Campus has made me a better student 19 and a better person, because my experience from like 20 21 going from different schools like all the time, and I finally found Campus, and it has changed my whole 22 23 direction on life because I have gone from like one 24 school teaching certain things and not teaching me

like certain material to another school that just does certain things, but what Campus does is they teach you like all of it. And it's like you don't just get bits and pieces of stuff; you get the whole thing. And, honestly, I don't think I would be the person I am today if I didn't go to Campus.

Also, the one thing that I would miss the most about Campus is -- I'm an eighth grader -- is that the bond you have with the teachers and the students. With the teachers it's not like just strictly, oh, you're my teacher and, you know, you're teaching me and life moves on. It's you have that connection with them, and like you have this relationship where you can talk to your teacher after class and you can ask them for help and stuff like that.

And with the relationship with students is that nobody really like hates each other in our school. Like we are all just like one big family there. Like people might be different from others or unique, but we don't treat them with disrespect; we treat them with love and kindness, as everyone always should.

And, actually, the school, it's full



1	of positive energy, and it's full of light and
2	happiness. And that's it.
3	MS. NAGOURNEY: Thank you.
4	MYA BOWERS: You are welcome.
5	MS. HICKEY: Did you say your full
6	name?
7	MYA BOWERS: Yes.
8	MS. HICKEY: What is your middle
9	name?
10	MYA BOWERS: Renea.
11	MS. HICKEY: Renea. Thank you.
12	MR. TRAVERS: There is another
13	student that would like to speak. May she go before
14	I?
15	MS. NAGOURNEY: Yes. Sure.
16	ENOCHLINE JEBLEH: Hi.
17	MS. NAGOURNEY: Can you spell your
18	name?
19	ENOCHLINE JEBLEH: E-N-O-C-H-L-I-N-E,
20	and J-E-B-L-E-H. It's a very different name.
21	MS. NAGOURNEY: Okay.
22	ENOCHLINE JEBLEH: Oh, okay. So I
23	was asked to answer a couple questions. Um, my
24	first question is what I like about CCS. And I said



what I like about CCS is the students and the teachers.

Students, why? Because I first started the school when I was in fifth grade, and I thought I wasn't going to fit in or it was going to be like really hard to work and stuff. But when I went there, everyone was friendly, they were nice, they welcomed me in, they showed me around.

and I said the teachers because they really paid attention to me. They helped me when I needed help. They, once you get a relationship with them, it's really hard to like break apart. Because I know some kids who were in college that still come back to the school just to visit their teachers who went there.

And I feel like that really has an affect on the rest of your life, because once you have -- once you create a bond with people and you are able to go back to them, it's you always know you have them there. It's really comforting.

And the next question, what has CCS done to make me a better student/person? It really showed me how to become a better person. It showed me how to speak my mind, how to work harder. And

the teachers there showed me how to work harder, because if I had just a teeny bit of like if I felt like oh, I might not understand this, I have like five teachers, "What don't you understand? Do you need help?" Like they are always there trying to help you, trying to make sure you are improving and getting better and better and better.

And also we do take a lot of trips and field trips, and not just we are going to the beach or like that. But, no, we do trips like Junior, Honor Junior Society and trips like that. And they are mainly focused on helping us build up our future, helping us to figure out what we want to do when we grow up, how are we going to do it, and things like that.

Okay. What I am going to miss about CCS is the teachers and the kids and how we worked. Because I said how we worked, because the way we work there is very, very creative. It's not just you sit in a classroom and it's on paper. No, in math class, if we're doing something with a measurement, we'll go outside, we'll grab our rulers, and start measuring.

If we are doing something in ELA



1 about reading, or like we were doing -- we were doing this one where we had to write a script and 2 like -- I don't remember, Shakespeare, and we 3 4 actually -- we had to act that out, and I thought it was really cool. And I would feel like I would 5 6 really miss that. And lastly but not least: 7 What do you think CCS means to other students? 8 I said I think CCS means a safe environment where they are 9 free to explore and be themselves and grow up 10 11 educationally with all the help they can get. 12 MS. NAGOURNEY: Thank you. 13 MR. TRAVERS: I'm Leroy Travers. I'm 14 the principal. I will be brief. First of all, I want to say thank you 15 16 for giving us this opportunity. You have heard 17 enough from me. So, you know, you heard just three 18 experiences, but there are hundreds and hundreds of experiences like this at our school. 19 And these guys, what you heard today is -- they are the rules; 20 21 they are not the exception. We really are the little school of hope in Dover for a lot of people. 22 23 And, you know, over the next five 24 years, you know, we are going to continue to be



1	that. There are children being born right now that
2	will escape their lives, which may not be very good,
3	to come to our school and experience what these guys
4	have experienced and leave as better people and
5	discover that there is more out there than just
6	pencil and paper.
7	So, again, we appreciate this
8	opportunity, and we are looking forward to
9	December 17. And we thank you.
10	MS. NAGOURNEY: Thank you. Is there
11	anyone else who wants to speak? Is there anyone
12	else here who has not signed in for CCS? If not,
13	please do.
14	If there are no other speakers, I
15	want to thank all of you for participating today.
16	The Secretary will consider your comments as part of
17	the decision-making process. And your comments will
18	also be available for the State Board to consider.
19	The hearing is now closed. Thank you.
