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1 MR. TRAVERS: Good evening,  
2 everyone. I declare the public hearing for  
3 Newark Charter School to be open.

4 My name is Leroy Travers. I'm  
5 the lead education associate with the  
6 Charter School Office and I've been  
7 appointed by the Secretary to conduct this  
8 public hearing.

9 Newark Charter School has filed  
10 an application to modify its charter to  
11 increase its approved enrollment beginning  
12 in the school year 2022-2023 and reaching  
13 full enrollment by the year 2025 and 2026.  
14 The school has also requested to build a  
15 junior high school on currently owned land  
16 and renovate current facilities.

17 As is required by law, the  
18 matter was referred to the Charter School  
19 Accountability Committee for investigation  
20 and report. This joint public hearing is  
21 being held by the Department of Education  
22 and the State Board of Education.

23 I'll now ask the others at the  
24 table to introduce themselves.



1 MS. FIFER: Candice Fifer with  
2 the State Board of Education.

3 MR. PARSON: Darryl Parson,  
4 Department of Justice.

5 MR. TRAVERS: I would like the  
6 report to reflect that the notice of the  
7 time, date and place of today's public  
8 hearing was published at the Charter School  
9 Office Accountability Committee's official  
10 place of business, on the Department of  
11 Education's official website, and on the  
12 State Public Meeting Calendar on the  
13 State's official website.

14 A court reporter is present so  
15 that a record of this hearing can be made.  
16 It will be necessary for each speaker to  
17 clearly identify his- or herself before  
18 beginning to speak so the court reporter  
19 will be able to note who you are. Again,  
20 please, if you speak, have a seat at one of  
21 the chairs at the end of the table.

22 The record of this hearing will  
23 be provided to the Secretary of Education  
24 and the members of the State Board of



1 Education, together with any written or  
2 electronic comments received during the  
3 renewal decision process. To date,  
4 comments received on this renewal  
5 application are posted on the Charter  
6 School Office's website.

7 We will proceed in the  
8 following manner. First we will hear from  
9 representatives of the charter school who  
10 wish to comment on the renewal application.

11 Next we take comments from the  
12 public. There are sign-up sheets in the  
13 back. If there's anyone that wishes to  
14 sign up that hasn't done so, please  
15 indicate so now.

16 Okay. I reserve the right to  
17 impose reasonable time, place and manner  
18 restrictions if the speakers prevent this  
19 hearing from accomplishing its goal in a  
20 reasonable manner. This hearing's purpose  
21 is strictly to collect public comment.  
22 Questions of the Department of Education or  
23 the State Board of Education are not  
24 permitted and will not be acknowledged.



1                   At this point the Committee  
2 will accept comments from any school  
3 representatives.

4                   DR. NEWTON: Good evening.  
5                   Thank you.

6                   My name is Franklin Newton.  
7 I'm the school director for Newark Charter  
8 School.

9                   Let me start by saying our  
10 board chair, Adrian Soyer, wanted to be  
11 here, but he had a work commitment that he  
12 couldn't reschedule. So he wanted to make  
13 sure that his lack of presence here was not  
14 perceived as a lack of support. That is  
15 not the case.

16                   It is my honor and pleasure to  
17 talk with you. I want to say thank you for  
18 allowing us to put in the modification  
19 request and have that entertained and have  
20 people really spend time looking through it  
21 and spending time exploring that. So we  
22 are grateful to the Department of Ed, the  
23 Charter School Office, CSAC, as well as the  
24 State Board of Ed.



1           We at Newark Charter School are  
2 happy to share our school's story with you  
3 at this public hearing as you consider our  
4 request for modification.

5           We at Newark Charter are proud  
6 to be part of the Delaware public education  
7 landscape for the past 19 years and leaders  
8 in the success of charter schools in our  
9 state. As this committee is no doubt aware  
10 that, effective on July 1st, 2019, our  
11 charter was renewed for a ten-year term and  
12 is in effect until June 30th, 2029. It's  
13 an honor for us to have been recognized and  
14 to be one of only two charter schools to  
15 receive a ten-year renewal.

16           Having been involved at Newark  
17 Charter School for the past 13 years as a  
18 parent, a board member, chair of the board,  
19 and now as head of school, I've seen the  
20 positive impact that Newark Charter has had  
21 on our families individually and  
22 collectively our community. I have  
23 witnessed firsthand the hard work and  
24 dedication of our students, parents and



1 teachers and staff who took our school from  
2 an idea to a middle school spending its  
3 first two years in rented trailers to a  
4 three-building, multicampus school of  
5 2412 students in kindergarten through  
6 Grade 12. Like our other charter schools  
7 in Delaware, Newark Charter School  
8 demonstrates what can be accomplished when  
9 autonomy, accountability and the school --  
10 and choice -- excuse me -- combine with  
11 inspiration, innovation and commitment to  
12 meet the needs of the communities we are  
13 chartered to serve.

14           During the previous  
15 modification and renewal processes, our  
16 school has done what we said we would do,  
17 did it to the best of our ability and  
18 delivered positive results, excellent  
19 outcomes and performance. Our track record  
20 since our initial charter approval  
21 April 20th of 2000, which, for the record,  
22 was 7,235 days ago -- but who's counting --  
23 has been unswervingly strong. The past  
24 almost two decades of success, we believe,





1 positions us well for continued success  
2 during the next decade.

3 To see some of the strongest  
4 evidence to support this modification  
5 request, one need only look to the  
6 objective data of our organizational  
7 stability, consistently high levels of  
8 community demand, our demonstrated track  
9 record of fiscal and managerial fidelity  
10 and, most importantly, our students'  
11 academic success. A review of these  
12 metrics predicts a continued bright and  
13 promising future and encourages positive  
14 support of our modification request.

15 Our percentage of minority  
16 students has increased every year for  
17 19 consecutive years. Our student  
18 diversity is more than representative of  
19 the Newark area and closely mirrors the  
20 population of New Castle County, Delaware.  
21 When we opened our doors in 2001, our  
22 student body was 84.5 percent Caucasian.  
23 This year it was 61.4 percent. As stated  
24 previously, due to our commitment and



1 outreach, our entering classes continue to  
2 become more diverse and fully  
3 representative of our communities. This  
4 year the entering kindergarten class cohort  
5 was 50.8 percent Caucasian, which is more  
6 than representative of the area that we  
7 serve.

8 Our students are representative  
9 of the area we are chartered to serve and  
10 also represent a range of learning  
11 abilities. Our population of students with  
12 intense or complex disabilities has grown  
13 steadily every year, and we are educating  
14 students in A, B and C settings throughout  
15 our grade levels. We are proud that the  
16 National Association of Special Education  
17 Teachers has named Newark Charter School an  
18 "Exceptional Charter School in Special  
19 Education" for the last several years.

20 What distinguishes NCS is  
21 evident to anyone who has visited. We are  
22 a community of learners who share a common  
23 vision of what excellence looks like for  
24 each and every student. We pull together



1 in the same direction every day to achieve  
2 that vision. We've never strayed from our  
3 mission and our core values, which are as  
4 vital today as when the school was first  
5 conceived.

6 As I said, we are grateful to  
7 the Department of Education and the State  
8 of Board of Ed for having faith in Newark  
9 Charter School from the start and for being  
10 an essential part of our growth and  
11 continuing success over the last 19 years.  
12 Working together, we have created something  
13 special. And in doing so, we have changed  
14 the lives of literally thousands of young  
15 people. Authorizing our current request  
16 will allow more Delaware children the  
17 opportunity to benefit from all that we  
18 have created together.

19 High quality public schools are  
20 exactly what Delaware is working hard to  
21 accomplish. Expansion of enrollment in  
22 high quality charter schools like NCS is  
23 one of the easiest, low-risk, low-cost ways  
24 to do that. This opinion is shared by the



1 U.S. Department of Education, the National  
2 Governors Association, the National  
3 Association of Public Charter Schools and  
4 many others.

5 I urge you to approve Newark  
6 Charter School's modification application  
7 and allow us to provide a high quality  
8 experience for more students.

9 Thank you.

10 MR. TRAVERS: At this time we  
11 have no public comment, so I want to thank  
12 you all for participating today. The  
13 Secretary will consider your comments in  
14 deciding, at the conclusion of the renewal  
15 process, what decision to submit to the  
16 State Board for assent.

17 The hearing for Newark Charter  
18 School is now closed.

19 Thank you.

21 approximately 5:28 p.m. this same day.)

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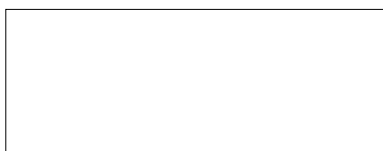
