ESSA Overview

- Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)
 - Main federal law governing funding of public education
 - Gives states more flexibility than under the previous law
 - Allows for more state and local control than under the previous law
- Under ESSA, states are required to outline their plans for:
 - Spending federal funds
 - Measuring the skills students learn
 - Supporting students in making academic progress

ESSA in Delaware (1 of 2)

- Delaware's ESSA plan was submitted in April 2017
 - Reflects Delaware's educational priorities
 - Outlines strategies for:
 - Required assessments
 - Accountability
 - School, educator, and student supports
 - Builds on Delaware's successes



ESSA in Delaware (2 of 2)

 Delaware collected more than 1,000 comments and suggestions while drafting the ESSA plan



 Delaware's ESSA plan received final approval from the U.S.
 Department of Education on August 2, 2017




Report Card Overview

- ESSA requires the creation of state, district and school report cards
- Report cards must be easy for parents, caregivers, and the other stakeholders to access and understand
- Report Cards must be published by December 31, 2018

- DOE fulfills the requirement through School Profiles






ESSA - Reporting New Items

- Some of the new items that will be publicly reported in the Report Card include:
 - Long-term goals and measurements of interim progress
 - English language proficiency attainment
 - District preschool programs
 - Chronic absenteeism

Delaware State Report Card

- Purpose To provide comprehensive and understandable information at the State, District, and School levels, enabling parents, community members and other stakeholders to engage meaningfully in public education decisions.
- Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires public reporting on schools.
 - Delaware State Report Card will replace the current School Profiles site.

The first phase of the report card will be published by the end of December 2018.

Stakeholder Input - History

- October 2017 The Delaware Department of Education hosted five community conversation meetings throughout the state.
 - Provided background about the Delaware Report Card
 - Solicit recommendations for how educational information and data would be shared
- February 2018 The department collected over 300 feedback responses to an online survey focused on data visual and context.
